Mass Cleaning Drive, initiated by TNAU

A Cleanliness drive was organized by National Service Scheme, Tamil Nadu Agricultural University, Coimbatore on 2nd October 2014 as part of Swachh Bharat Abiyan (Clean India Mission) of the Urban Development Ministry, Government of India kick started by the Prime Minister.
